Research discovery makes world of difference for Yusuf

At the age of 16, most teenagers are looking forward to getting their driver's license. Yusuf looked forward to simply getting out of his hospital bed.

In July 2012, Yusuf was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, a cancerous bone tumour that often develops in adolescence. Patients with this disease must stay in the hospital for three to four days after each chemotherapy treatment to ensure they are healthy enough to go home. Suddenly, he found himself spending more time in a hospital than he ever thought he would.

"Being at the hospital was a constant reminder that I was sick," says Yusuf. "My spirits weren't the best and I felt glued to my bed, constantly watching the clock."

Luckily, a new donor-funded pilot project at SickKids is changing things for patients like Yusuf. He became the first of two paediatric patients in Canada to receive portable cancer treatment through a blue backpack that he carried with him at all times. This meant he was no longer required to stay so long at the hospital, completing each treatment from the comfort of his own home.

This project also improved his overall quality of life. Before his backpack, Yusuf was spending the equivalent of four days in hospital for each treatment. With the help of the backpack, he only had to spend 22 hours at the hospital.

Today, Yusuf is finished his treatment, and hopefully the

only backpack he'll have to carry from now on is one for his textbooks.

The project was initiated and managed by the Garron Family Cancer Centre at SickKids. The Centre is Canada's largest and busiest paediatric cancer centre, treating 25 per cent of all new childhood cancer cases in the country.

Building on what they've learned from the first two patients, the research team is looking forward to offering the backpack program to other sarcoma patients in 2014.

A legacy for nursing

The polio epidemic that crippled tens of thousands of Canadians had passed, women in Quebec had won the right to vote and World War II dominated the headlines. It was 1944 and Margaret Platt, a 25-yearold nurse from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario was at The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto to do her paediatric clinical training.

In 1944, the 320-bed hospital occupied land at the corner of Elizabeth and College Streets, the place it would remain until 1951 when the present day SickKids would open at 555 University.

Margaret's eldest son, Archie, recounts his mother's memories about her time at the hospital. "My mom fondly remembers being assigned to take care of premature babies who had been placed in a special room. She would feed the babies every three hours and ensure that they were all receiving the best care possible. She learned how to make formula, tend to patients at the bedside and assist with surgeries. The skills she gained really enhanced her ability to do her job to the best of her ability. She even recollects one particular patient who would sing the hymn, "We Are Fishers of Men," to her every morning. She thought he had a lovely singing voice."

Archie says that from day one, nursing was Margaret's calling in life. "She's a nurse in every sense of the word. To this day, it is part of who she is, and SickKids played a big part in that."

Last year, Archie and his two brothers decided that they wanted to do something to honour their mother. "We asked her how she wanted to be remembered, what she wanted her legacy to be." Margaret's response? "SickKids."

Margaret's wish was granted. Her three sons made a commitment to the hospital to establish a nursing education fund in her name. The gift will help give nurses at SickKids the opportunity to get specialized training in paediatric clinical care, just as Margaret did 70 years ago.

"She speaks so fondly of SickKids," says Archie. "She has a great affinity for the hospital and it will always have a very special place in her heart. SickKids gave so much to her and this is her way of giving back."
